LIBRARIES INVEST IN THEIR COMMUNITIES!

Libraries not only help those who enter their walls but build strategic partnerships with other community agencies. WLS and the libraries are not direct social service providers; but by distributing information for, increasing awareness of and working with community partners, libraries can help address the growing list of social needs and provide a clearer referral path to the resources available. Here is a sampling of innovative collaborations.

Libraries are uniquely positioned to assist with the goals and objectives to increase awareness of the importance of a complete count for **Census 2020**, the first to allow for online responses. As a trusted institution, libraries can dispel fear and mistrust and remove digital barriers (digital skills, internet and computer access). WLS is actively involved in the Westchester County Complete Count Committee (CCC), and WLS and its member libraries have formed their own CCC. Training is being provided about the 2020 Census questions and how library staff can

assist their users—whether via distribution of printed materials, referral to another resource or the use of dedicated Census kiosks.

Westchester Resilience Coalition fosters awareness of the impact of trauma and exploration of actions that can prevent and heal trauma. WLS provides Breath-Body-Mind Workshops that teach simple techniques for reducing stress, allowing individuals to focus their thoughts and positively engage with the world around them.


The Empathy-Driven Problem Solving series focused on the impact of homelessness and housing insecurity on individual behavior and introduced techniques for engaging individuals who can be challenging to service.

As a result of working with the Coalition, "Kid Zone" book carts were placed in 3 major Department of Social Services offices. These carts offer a distraction for young children accompanying their parents during the process to obtain essential services and an opportunity to promote library resources and early literacy.

In it's fourth year, AARP Foundation has offered Tax Preparation for free at 14 library locations. WLS assists with providing space for training of the volunteers and internet connection at the libraries for the e-filing services for both Federal and State tax returns. About 7,700 Westchester tax payers were helped. By ensuring that tax payers received the refunds due to them and tax credits to which they were entitled, approximately \$4 million in disposable income was returned.

WLS promoted an **Early Literacy Outreach** program among library staff concurrent with

conducting outreach at early childhood centers and Head Start programs in a number of Westchester Communities. The key aim was to make an active connection between new families and their local library. A bilingual songbook entitled, Let's Sing/Vamos a Cantar, was distributed to libraries, partner agencies, hospitals and other venues



to build awareness of the importance of early literacy and local library services.

Read Better, WLS's core literacy tutoring service offered in collaboration with Hadassah Westchester, is a companion service to HSE Connect! that offers information on pathways and resources for obtaining a high school equivalency (HSE) diploma. Read Better volunteer tutors meet adult developing readers at library locations convenient to the student.
