

Dr. LaRuth Gray



Senior Adviser to the Executive Director Scholar in Residence New York University

LaRuth Hackney Gray dedicates herself to improving the quality of education, as well as the quality of life for children. Dr. Gray currently serves as Scholar in Residence for the Metropolitan of Center Urban Education

(Metro Center) at New York University. Prior to this appointment, she had served as Deputy Director of METRO Center and as an Affiliate Professor in the Administration, Leadership and Technology Program in NYU's Steinhardt School of Culture, Education and Human Development. She began her career in education as a teacher in the New Rochelle City School District and moved up in the ranks to become Chairman of the Language Arts Department. From there, she was named first as Principal, then as Director of Instruction and finally, Assistant Superintendent. She then joined the Abbott Union Free District as a Superintendent, retiring from superintendency in 1989.

In addition to numerous recognition and awards, Dr. Gray has been recognized by the Dean of NYU Steinhart with a Faculty Award for Outstanding Service; the National School Boards Association as one of the "100 Outstanding Educators in Small School Districts in North America"; the Congressional Black Caucus Education Brain-trust for her Excellence and Equity in Education; the American Association of School Administrators as one of the ten pioneering Sheroes for helping break the glass ceiling for women in Education in the Country for the last 3 decades.

Her growing list of publications includes: "The No Child Left behind Act: "Threats and Opportunities," Journal of Negro Education (2005), "White and Black Females in the Classroom," American Educational Journal (2000);

"The Best For Our Children: The Sherburne Earville Story," Metro Center Press, New York University (1993); "Women of Color: In a Different Context" from An Action Plan for Equity in New York State Education Administration, New York State Congress of School Administrator Organizations Publications (1994) and the list continues.

She currently serves on the Board of Directors for two organizations: The New York Metro Library Council and The Westchester Library. She serves on the Board of Trustees for the Katonah Museum of Art and is a Westchester County Fair Campaign Practices Committee Member.

A graduate of Howard University, Nova University, and Columbia University Teacher's College, Dr. Gray is married to Joseph Morgan, who is also an educator. She is the mother of Diendra Gray Clark, a minister and Philip Gray, a certified CPA and a financial analyst.

White Plains Library's fine idea: no fines for late children and young adult materials

WHITE PLAINS — The White Plains Public Library announced this week that it will no longer charge late fees for children and young adult materials, making it easier for youngsters to continue checking out books.

"One of the most important things we do is to cultivate reading among young people — that's one of the things we're put on earth for," said Library Director Brian Kenney. "Research has shown that having books in the home is a critical factor in becoming a reader, but too many young people can't borrow books because of outstanding fines."

From now on, young people who check out materials from "The Trove" library for children or "The Edge" teen library will not be fined if they are late returning the books.

Nonetheless, Kenney said, the materials are expected to be returned on time and the parents or guardians of the young people will be held responsible for making sure they are, or risk having their account suspended. Books or other materials that are not returned will be considered lost, and the patrons will be billed for the cost. Those with \$25 or more of lost materials will have their library privileges suspended until the books are returned or paid for.

Kenney said the Mamaroneck and Harrison libraries are adopting similar policies, which he said is part of a national trend. Research shows that the books generally are returned on time and that the lack of fines does encourage youngsters to check out more books, he said.

Budget crisis will end Yonkers libraries' Sunday service

The library faces a 7 percent cut to its budget in Mayor Mike Spano's proposed 2018-19 budget, which takes effect July 1. That translates into an approximately \$700,000 reduction.

Most of the cuts were in the library's personnel services, according to an April 2018 management report submitted to the Yonkers Public Library's board of trustees, who are scheduled to meet on Thursday afternoon.

Currently the library offers Sunday hours at all three of its branches from noon to 5 p.m.

The Sunday hours are not offered in July and August, so the Sunday closures are expected to take effect in September.

The library's final budget is in the hands of the Yonkers City Council, which has scheduled a hearing on the library's budget for May 23.

The City Council must adopt the city budget by June 1.

New Rochelle: 'Save our library' petition gains traction

NEW ROCHELLE - Despite some residents' concerns for the future of the public library, the library's Board of Trustees said there are no plans to redevelop the iconic building in the heart of the city's downtown.

"As of today, there's no agreement," said New Rochelle Public Library Director Tom Geoffino, referring to ongoing discussions with developer RXR over the future of the library property, at 1 Library Plaza.

The site was identified in the city's 2015 master plan (/story/news/local/westchester/new-rochelle/2016/12/01/new-rochelles-downtown-redevelopment-taking-shape/94606176/) as a potential area for redevelopment. Although library officials say they've been in talks with the developer for two years, they

declined to say what the ultimate goal is.

Nonetheless, <u>residents have created a petition (https://www.thepetitionsite.com/361/154/816/save-our-library/</u>) discouraging the library's Board of Trustees from entering into a partnership with RXR.

The petition is being pushed by Library United, a social activist group of New Rochelle residents that was created around the same time the 2015 master plan was approved.

"I learned to read on the library's steps," said Library United member Gordon Hiland. "I love the library, and that it's in downtown New Rochelle."

In response to the petition, a <u>library board statement (https://nrpl.org/about/board/)</u> said they "entered into these discussions with the sole goal of exploring a potential opportunity to provide our patrons and the residents of our city with an enhanced, state of the art, sustainable resource."

Most recently, the trustees discussed a deal with RXR that would have required the company to fund hiring a consultant to assess the value of the property. In exchange, RXR would get the rights to future development.

Library board President Chuck Burke declined to give more details of the discussions.

"Our statement speaks to the truth and the reality of where things are," he said.

Burke said a vote on the agreement has not been scheduled.

"When the board is prepared to vote on an agreement with RXR, we will post it on our website seven days in advance," he said.

Whatever happens, Burke said the library board will ensure that services aren't interrupted.

"This is between RXR and the library board," said New Rochelle Commissioner of Development Luiz Aragon. "We, the city, have no say and we don't want to push it in one direction or another. It's entirely up to them."

The library is valued at roughly \$12 million, according to the city's assessor office.

Hiland said he posted the petition online last month. It has received just over 300 signatures, a third of the way to its goal of 1,000.

"I hope the petition puts pressure on the library Board of Trustees to not sell this asset," Hiland said.
